St. Francis of Assisi and the Blessing of Pets


Praise the Lord from the earth, you sea monsters and all deeps,

REFUGEE NEWS

As you know, the application to sponsor Lama and her four children, refugees from Syria now in a camp in Lebanon, is now being processed at the Canadian Visa Office in Beirut. This may take several more months.

The applications to sponsor Lama's parents, Nasriddin and Fatmeh, and her younger brother, Ward, have now been submitted to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada. St. Philip's is sponsoring them in partnership with Gloria Dei Lutheran Church. The applications were submitted by Canadian Lutheran World Relief which handles refugee sponsorship for the Lutheran Church. We are grateful for the help of the Lutherans, as our diocese did not receive sufficient allocations, i.e. sponsorship application spaces, for them. The applications for refugee sponsorship of Lama's parents and brother have been approved and sent to the Canadian Visa Office in Beirut for further processing. (This apparently means the applications are approved, and then the Visa Office decides about approving the refugees).

NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY

Pauline and I started out from McBride Park and drove to St John's Shaughnessy to meet Ken and pick up their packets. We had a bit of a wait but did get off about 10.10am. Pauline and I were thrilled that Ken was able to join us for St John's new adventure with the Neighbourhood Ministry.

We could not find Shawn and Glen on Granville. Drove around Granville and W Broadway as Ken has seen people there and up the Alleys. Drove up to 15th but no homeless there this am.

No one along W Broadway until we got to Safeway at Macdonald where Pauline and Ken went to check on S who was asleep. They wakened him and he was not coherent and very confused. Took only some bars and Boost.

Headed to Jericho so we would not miss the gang. T, B and J, who is deaf and dumb, were all happy with the sandwiches, bananas, hard boiled eggs and packets. Across the street were J and C and they also were happy to take what we had.

T is still not drinking and has bought himself an PS 4 and so is happily playing video games. B was thrilled as he is feeling so much better and says he is healthier. J is so excited with the news that after tests she is cancer

free. Ken was introduced to them all and joined it chatting with them.

Headed down 4th Ave to Safeway where Ken and I went to chat with T in front of Whole Foods while Pauline went to Shoppers to see R.

T has an apt not far from 4th, but is very interested in going back to church, was asking us where we went so we told him where our 4 churches are and he thinks he might try St Helen's as it is closest to him. I told him that where ever he decided to go that he would be warmly welcomed.

R is a young man , probably in his thirties, and was telling Pauline that he was very cold and when she gave him the food he gobbled down the sandwich right away. He said that he needed underwear. Pauline asked him if he knew about the Kits Shower programme and he did. He has accommodation at the Vogue on Granville but only leaves his belongings there as there are cockroaches and it is not clean. He is not threatened by anyone who lives there. His mother lives in Surrey and he leaves his valuables there, including underwear. He used to live with his mother who has cancer but left and does visit her 2-3 times a week. He thinks they might move in together again but he does not want to live in Surrey and she wants to be near the clinics and the doctors who are looking after her. She does his washing for him. Since he was cold and I had several winter coats I ask Pauline to tell him that we would go to my place and would come back with a warm coat. We did and took two of the coats back to him and left them as he was asleep. Piled some food bags and a bag of his on top so that no one would notice them.

Then on to MacDonald's at Balsam and 4th where where Ken and I met M who was having a piece of Lemon Meringue which some one had given him. He has come recently from Ontario and had his back pack with his ID stolen while he went to the bathroom. I told him about the Kits Shower Programme and that there were people there who could help him with the right people to contact. He was very appreciative. Took all the food and packet that we offered him.

We finished about 12:15 and took Ken back to St John's and divided up the packets that were left. I asked Ken to please "Congratulate his Indoor Team for the wonderful job they had done getting the packets and food beautifully organized". They had made at least 15 Peanut butter and jam sandwiches, lots of bananas, at least 15 or more packets, 2 dozen hard-boiled eggs. A wonderful feast for our special street people.

Pauline and I went back to check on Ryan and to make sure his coats were still there, which they were. This time we decided to wake him and he woke easily and smiled as soon as he saw Pauline. We had a really nice chat with him and when we left he said to us, "Thank you very much, God Bless you and you have made my day" He will be warm tonight.

A big thank you to Ken who was able to join us. He said that he really learned a lot and thoroughly enjoyed the new experience. It was a joy to have him with us.

Also a big thank you to Pauline who was able to come out so that I did not have to go on my own. It is so much nicer to have someone to share the this wonderful experience with, And it is nice to have a man with us as most of the homeless that we have are Male.

It was a lovely morning and we all felt that we had had good conversations and we were able to impart lots of information.

I apologize for the length of this but we all three had a special morning and this always is the Highlight of my week.
