#### NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY WEEKLY REPORT

Dale, Paris and I set out this sunny morning from St. Anselm's, where Jill amply provided us with packets, bananas, Halloween treats, and a big bag of warm clothing.

Our first stop was at the United Church on West 8th, but B was not there, and his space did not look like it had been occupied recently. We then tried St. Helen's, but it didn't look like he had been camping there either.

At West Fourth and Highbury we found T, J, R, D, D and W. All gratefully accepted packets. We took the opportunity to update J, D and R on the winter shelter situation, letting them know that Molly, the City Outreach worker who had accompanied the team on the street walk last week, will be reconnecting with them early Monday morning. J said that she is not seeking a winter shelter at this time, as she is close to finding housing. R said that he would be at the corner of Arbutus and Broadway (at the 99 Bus Stop) on Monday from 11 am on, but D has a job and will be working on Monday. They both expressed reservations about going into a shelter, but R said he would talk with Molly on Monday.

ST. OHN'S ST. HELEN'S PHILPS

Next we circled back to the beach, but did not find anyone at the Jericho Hostel, the Locarno Beach concession, or the Pump station. We did find M, who had set up camp in the wooded area of Locarno Park. He had a pallet to sleep on, and several tarps. M has limited English – he speaks Spanish – but we managed to find out that he still has a place at the Regent Hotel downtown, but likes to sleep outside. He took a packet and was delighted to take a raincoat and several other items of clothing in his size.

In front of the Shoppers at West Fourth and Vine, we found S sleeping on a sun lounge. He was asleep when we got there, but woke up while we were there. He was grateful for a packet, and took several items of clothing that were in his size. He said that he was not interested in going into a shelter, because of previous bad experiences, but Paris said that he'd filled out a shelter form last week, so we also let him know that Molly would be coming around on Monday morning, and he was agreeable to this.

In front of Whole Foods, we gave P and T packets. T was very chatty today, and wanted to know about the churches in the NM group. He took the last item of clothing we had, a T-shirt.

We found S and G on South Granville, in their sleeping bags in a sunny spot in between buildings. They both took packets, and we let them know that Molly would be coming around on Monday morning to talk about winter shelters with them.

We looked for S in front of London Drugs on Broadway and in front of the Safeway at Broadway and MacDonald, but he was not in either place, which is unusual.
