FROM THE PRIEST IN CHARGE

Joining anything new is a drawn out process of orientation. In May I joined the staff team at St. Philip's Church and they have been a huge help to me as I orient to the complex and rich cloth of activity woven over decades by members of the Parish. Every day I learn some new story to help me understand the reason certain threads or colours stand out over others. St. Philip's Church is a stimulating and fun community.

As part of her recent visit to our parish Bishop Melissa met with members of the leadership team and challenged them to think about Church Growth as they move forward in the development of a Parish Profile. She spoke of a key component in her strategy to build strong Church families throughout our Diocese: Invite, Welcome, Orient, and Incorporate. I think I remember these correctly.

It is very easy for members of this parish to invite friends and neighbours to come and see our common life. Our liturgies are rich and vibrant. The music is excellent. We are involved in our community through outreach programs both on and off site. Our Music Director arranges amazing monthly concerts and I have so far invited more than a dozen friends to join me at these concerts and for dinner following at a local restaurant. Most had no idea St. Philip's sponsored such quality events and left uplifted by their experience. Others in the community are seeking cost effective quality programs for children and youth (St. Philip's Church abounds with answers and opportunity). I heard recently that the majority of those over the age of 80 suffer from loneliness. Involvement in our community and our outreach to those unable to get out regularly helps with this issue of aging. All of us are in a position to invite people to join in the fabric of our common life.

My arrival was met with welcome and the Bishop was greeted with cake. The way we choose to make visitors feel a part of this place depends on all of us. Sometimes visitors only want to share our common meal and run. Others want to move deeper into our life and find out more about what makes the parish tick. Orientation is often piecemeal in the life of the Church. I remember feeling part of one parish more than a year after I joined officially. It took people a year to show me the hidden key to the coffee cupboard. Thereafter I made sure new members knew the secret more rapidly than my experience. There may be more that the people of this place can do to systematically help with the orientation of new members. I expect parish leadership will explore this in the weeks to come.

And then there is incorporation, that point at which each of us understands that we are part of the team, that we

carry the story of St. Philip's Church as part of our own story. Our sense of membership moves out of cyberspace and into the heart. We are emotionally attached and care about all those who together make up the beautiful tapestry we share together. To be part of a family is to take responsibility through sharing our time, talents and treasure. Through the shared action of many different threads the cloth gains its strength.

As we continue to prepare for new clergy leadership in the years to come we ask God to bless the cloth of Philip God has helped to weave here in Dunbar.

THE ALTAR GUILD

The Altar Guild is a group of dedicated parishioners who are responsible for preparing the church for weekly and Sunday services.

Among the duties involved are arranging the flowers, setting out the Eucharist vessels, clearing after the services, caring for the Eucharist linens, and changing the hangings in accordance with the church calendar and for special occasions such as baptisms, weddings and funerals. The Guild also decorates the Church for festivals throughout the year.

The Guild works in four teams of 4 or 5, each team being responsible for one week a month. The church is prepared on Saturday mornings for the Sunday services. This usually takes about one and a half hours.

The Guild is an integral part of worship at St. Philip's and does its work quietly and with great devotion and care. We always welcome new members. If you would like more information, or would like to have a look 'behind the scenes', please contact us.

CURATE'S NOTES

One never expects September, and yet it arrives in a flurry of activity every year!

The summer was much busier than I expected, as well as much more dramatic than probably any summer of my life! On June 19th I was ordained to the priesthood, sharing the joy with six other new ordinands. A strong and absolutely astounding contingent from St. Philip's was there to celebrate with me, and I shall never forget the smiles on their faces or on the faces of those who were in church the following Sunday as I celebrated the Eucharist for the first time.

Being ordained to the priesthood was, to be honest, a very moving but in some ways rather frightening experience. A sense of unreality and uncertainty which had not been a part of my diaconal ordination was heavy on my heart – after such a long and wild journey toward answering this call, I felt like I wasn't sure what was supposed to happen next! This feeling has only intensified my gratitude for the love and support I have received from my family, friends, and all of you at St. Philip's. We truly are stronger together.

After that whirlwind, I got to jump in with both feet as John and Marilyn departed for some much deserved rest and left me at the helm! Thankfully July was quiet and I was able to relax into the feel of celebrating the Eucharist in a new way, as well as drinking in the steadiness and calm of Alt Vespers, our contemplative evening prayer service, which ran throughout the summer outside in the garden. We were a small community, usually no more than five, but it felt very special to gather just as the shadows began to lengthen and a pleasantly cool breeze refreshed us from the heat of the day. Facing the plants, we would spend half an hour singing, reading from Scripture, and practicing the discipline of silence quite naturally. Sometimes we would discuss the reading or the psalm for the day, wrestling with the text as Jacob wrestled with the angel. Sometimes we would hear a passage from another piece of literature and discuss that. Sometimes we would have a Godly Play session and wonder together. We are currently on hiatus, but I really hope that this community has a chance to continue the work we began together.

For one week in July, I had the great privilege of traveling up to Sorrento with my husband Paul to lead worship and music with St. Helen's music director, Kevin Zakresky. I was deeply honoured to meet and learn from John Bell, a theologian and composer of hymns from Scotland – he even joined our little worship choir! (Talk about pressure). I introduced the gathered community to two services I had crafted, one of which was the same Alt Vespers service I've introduced at St. Philip's, and one of which was its morning counterpart, Alt Matins. Each have their own musical selections included as well as space for great variation, creativity, and integration of all of God's people. This photo is a selfie of me and the children and youth who were there that week, all of whom were consulted and included in worship. When I wasn't leading worship, I was able to take some time with Paul to just

relax, play games on my tablet, and enjoy the company of those who had come to enrich their spiritual lives with all of the great courses on offer.

August was my month to step back and take some much needed time off. It was a long and blissfully quiet month that saw good company, good weather, lots of time for me to enjoy my many hobbies, and my first trip to a brand new retreat space which my dear friends Pastor Brian Heinrich and his partner Nathan had purchased in Gibson's the year before. The space, a monastery and accompanying retreat house, was built by a small community of Orthodox monks in 2005. All of it was crafted with love and great beauty by hand, with a huge garden and a hiking trail leading up to a stunning lookout. Every day saw fresh delicious food, lovely warm weather, laughter, and fooling around with

their two adorable whippets. I also got to meet the community of St. Bartholomew's Anglican Church, where Pastor Brian is serving as priest-in-charge. I was invited to celebrate at their Eucharist, a wonderful opportunity, and play my harp for their St. Bart's Day celebrations one gorgeous summer evening at the retreat house.

Now I'm home and happy to be back among you. September 14th marked my two-year anniversary at this amazing parish! There are going to be lots of great opportunities this year and I can't wait to share in them with you.

PROPOSED CHAPEL RENOVATION

The Chapel is a much-loved space that is used primarily for twice-weekly Eucharists and occasional private confessions and meetings with clergy. It is felt that by renovating the Chapel, it would be more versatile and



could be used more fully by the parish as a whole.

A Task Force was set up by John Stephens before his departure, to explore how best to renovate the Chapel in a sympathetic manner without losing the feeling of peace and sanctity created within it.

The aim is to make the space more open and

welcoming by replacing the pews with chairs which could be arranged in a number of different ways. The chapel would then

lend itself to being used for additional activities such as study groups and small meetings.

The first focus of the Task Force was to consider removing the steps so that the floor is all one level. The steps to the Sanctuary would be upgraded with a handrail added. A number of options are being considered at present regarding flooring, chairs and fabric. Suggestions and questions are welcome.

The Chapel will always remain a quiet space for confessions, personal prayer and reflection.

NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY FALL UPDATE

With another glorious summer behind us, and fall underway, I want to take this chance to fill you in on the activities of the Neighbourhood Ministry, a core outreach program of St. Anselm's, St. Helen's and St. Philip's Anglican churches on Vancouver's Westside. Through God's grace we have been blessed with abundance of good will and faithful works.

True to the 2008 origins of the Neighbourhood Ministry, outreach to needy neighbours living on the streets of the Westside remains strong. Our street teams, comprised of about 20 volunteers, hit the streets each Saturday morning to provide care packets, fresh food and most importantly, fellowship, to those we meet. We make about 600 connections each year during street walks. Donations from the parishes, gathered by indoor teams who pack the goods, is a critical aspect of this street work and we thank you all for your years of participation. We hope you enjoy the weekly write-ups provided by the street teams about who they meet and how people are faring.

The Neighbourhood Ministry's service at the 17th and Dunbar apartments continues strong, and is led by Joan Stewart, our Dunbar Liaison. The Dunbar apartments provide housing to people who have moved from the street, as well as people with mental health issues who require support in their daily living. Coast Mental Health manages the building. About 20 of the homeless people we have served over the years have called Dunbar their home. Our Dunbar volunteers (numbering about 20) participate in activities ranging from weekly meal service to seasonal celebrations to calling Bingo. In addition, volunteers support tenants on a one-on-one basis. The three churches also fund a breakfast program, which provides a nutritious start to the day for the 52 residents.

At the June 2016 Annual Meeting of the Neighbourhood Ministry, participants supported the launch of several new programs.

Spiritual Direction, led by Tim Cheek, offers Neighbourhood Ministry volunteers (and anyone else interested!) an opportunity to continue exploring their faith and reconciling their hearts, by joining in a circle of trust.

the Angels Program, led by Vicki Potter, offers volunteers a chance to be a one-on-one support to those in need, helping connect people with government services and health care providers, and simply being a trustworthy and reliable friend. Training is underway.

a Neighbourhood Care Unit, led by Rev. Dr. Pitman Potter, is being created to provide mobile health care and social work support to Westside neighbours in need. Often, accessing medical care is difficult for those living in marginal conditions. They find it hard to advocate for themselves, complete forms, or sustain regular contact with medical and social work staff. The Mobile Care Unit aims to break through these barriers. Rev. Pitman is establishing a network of partners for this ambitious endeavour. The UBC Schools of Medicine and Social Work are eager for their students to have the field experience the Mobile Care Unit provides and are creating supervised "credit courses" for the coming school year. Neighbourhood Ministry volunteers, who have generated a trusting relationship on the Westside streets, will help encourage use of the Mobile Care Unit by those they know in the neighbourhood. In addition, Rev. Pitman has connected with several community and church based programs that offer weekly community meals, including the Kitsilano Showers Program, St. Mary's Anglican and St. Augustine's Anglican, with the hope that their clients might be encouraged to use the services provided by the Mobile Care Unit. Efforts are underway to secure a vehicle. Following continued program design and training, it is anticipated the Mobile Care Unit will launch this coming winter. The Neighbourhood Ministry is always looking for volunteers who are eager to make a difference in the lives of our needy neighbours, and eager to transform their own lives through active service. MUSIC NOTES

This Fall brings with it a feast of music that delights the ears. Especially beautiful is the Music for Remembrance concert.

The Requiem by Maurice Duruflé to be presented on November 11th is one of the masterpieces of the choral genre. We have always enjoyed and been profoundly moved by the Music for Remembrance concerts. This year will be no exception. Duruflé composed his Requiem in 1947 and it has continued to be performed around the world since that time. In addition to the choir presenting the main feature, we will also have readings and a congregational hymn.

The end of WW II found Duruflé working on a suite of organ pieces based on Gregorian Chant melodies from the Mass for the Dead. His music can be described as restrained, tranquil and spiritual. To Duruflé, the organ 'represents the idea of peace, of faith and hope. The most beautiful movement in the work is the Pie Jesu for solo voice and cello with organ accompaniment. The text is as follows:

Pie Jesu Domine, dona eis requiem. Amen Lord, all pitying, Jesu blest, grant them Thine eternal rest. Amen

Please plan to attend, I look forward to seeing you.

Stewardship is not only about looking after the gifts we've been given - it's also about sustaining and growing those gifts for the future. It is about all of us as essential members of the Body of Christ and the life of our church.

The campaign will draw attention to many of the programs and people of this community, and invite each of us to carefully and prayerfully consider how we can contribute our gifts – our time, talents, and treasure – to help sustain and grow St. Philip's as we transition towards a new Rector. Come out to get to know more about who does what behind the scenes, and add your voice and your vitality to all that goes on here at St. Philip's.

REFUGEE UPDATE Mary Lymburner

In April, the Diocesan Refugee Unit, in discussion with St. Mary the Virgin Chaldean Church, Surrey, identified a refugee family for St. Philip's to sponsor into Canada. Iraqi Christians, the family left their home and small business and fled into Turkey. The Zirak family consists of parents, Yousif and Shamira, their five children ages 16, 15, 10, 5 and 4 and an 18 year old nephew. The estimated cost of supporting this family for one year is \$40,000 as the Chaldean Church, a congregation of mainly Iraqi Christians worshipping in the Anglican Church of the Epiphany in Surrey, have been given the use of a townhouse for them for one year and will also provide some start-up supplies.

We have committed to the sponsorship, and are now awaiting clearance from Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada to submit the application.

Thanks to your generous response the Refugee Fund stands at \$24,725, but we have not yet reached the final goal of \$40,000, so donations will be gratefully received. Cheques can be made payable to St. Philip's with Refugee Fund marked on the envelope, not just on the memo line.
