LENTEN SERIES

Our Lenten Series will begin on February 14th at 7:30 pm in the Fireside Room. The dates of the series are as follows: Wednesday, February 21st; Wednesday, February 28th; Wednesday, March 7th; **Tuesday, March 13th**; Wednesday, March 21st. The series will focus on the spirituality of a variety of traditions.

The first Lenten series presentation will be led by the Rev'd Canon Dr. Harold Munn on Ash Wednesday, after the Imposition of Ashes service, on the subject of Daily Office Prayers.

On Feb 21st: Lenten series #2: Patricia Vickers will speak on First Nations spirituality, "Ceremony and Healing the Soul". Patricia Vickers is of mixed heritage with ancestral roots in England, Heiltsuk (known to English speakers as Bella Bella) and Tsimshian (known to English speakers as Skeena) First Nations. She is currently Director of Mental Health and Wellness with First Nations Health Authority. She completed a doctorate degree in the transformative aspects of the Ayaawx (Tsimshian ancestral law).

Feb 28th: Lenten series #3: Aliya Hirji - Remembrance of God (Zikr) in Islam: Modes of Spiritual Reflection Aliya Hirji is an African-Indian-Canadian Ismaili Muslim woman with a BA in Family Studies with an interest in inter-generational transmission of religious values and traditions. Fulfillment to her since 2001 was, and continues to be, building relationships with communities around her on a personal level and travelling the world visiting places of worship in these areas.

March 7th: Lenten series #4: Laura Kaplan, Jewish Rabbi, speaks on Jewish spirituality: "God in Jewish Thought and Experience".

Rabbi Laura Duhan Kaplan is Professor of Jewish Studies and Director of Inter-Religious Studies at the Vancouver School of Theology. Her Ph.D. in philosophy, decade as a congregational Rabbi, and studies in Kabbalah have enriched her own experience of the Divine.

March 13th: (Tuesday) Lenten series #5: Bishop Skelton speaks on Anglican-Benedictine spirituality

March 21st: Lenten series #6: Harold speaks on current interpretations of the cross and resurrection.

NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY

On Saturday, January 6, Caroline and Mary from Team 4 and Charlotte, one of the social work students with the Mobile Care Unit, met at St. Anselm's where we were sent off by Marian Slater with lots of packets, hard boiled eggs and lots of clothing and blankets. We had brought some sandwiches. At 10th and Discovery we were joined by another team 4 member, Rhona.

At 4th and Highbury we met a particularly large group. B, T, D, M and J all have housing. S, R and D are still living outdoors, but hoping to get a place in Marpole when it opens. S says he stays outdoors by choice. We had met him previously on Broadway by the Safeway. All were happy to take food and J found a good coat among our supplies.

We went down to Jericho and Locarno beaches and by the Jericho Hostel but saw no one.

At 4th and Vine near the SW corner we met M. He used to be a regular in that area, but our team had not seen him for a long time. I gather the other teams have seen him recently. He has spent long periods in hospital in the last year, but does not look much changed. He is living outdoors despite some efforts by hospital social workers to find him a place. He is, as always, a bit rambling. He was happy to take food, and also a pair of gloves. On the NE corner we met P selling the Megaphone. He was cheerful as always and happy to take some food. A bit further along in front of Whole Foods we met N. He took one of our blankets as well as the food. He is living outdoors, says he has no ID, and is not a Canadian citizen, so believes he would not be eligible for housing. Charlotte is going to check what he would need in the way of documents to apply for the Marpole units.

We looked around the corner of Maple and 4th for R, but did not find him.

On the west side of Granville near 11th we met G. He seemed to have lots of bedding but seemed down and not very talkative. He said S had just gone away briefly. We left food for both of them. We did not see anyone else along Granville or the adjacent side streets.

On Broadway in front of London Drugs we found S. He looked cold but declined a blanket. He would like a better sleeping bag. He took some food.

We left some food for B on the porch of the United Church.

The leftover perishable items, mainly some fruit, were dropped off at the 17th and Dunbar building.
