The first Lenten series presentation will be led by the Rev'd Canon Dr. Harold Munn on Ash Wednesday, after the Imposition of Ashes service, on the subject of Daily Office Prayers. This session will begin at **8:00 pm** in the Fireside Room. **Please note the time change of the first session.** This is to accommodate the Ash Wednesday service which will precede the first session. All other sessions will begin at 7:00 pm.

On **Feb 21**st: Lenten series #2: Patricia Vickers will speak on First Nations spirituality, "Ceremony and Healing the Soul". Patricia Vickers is of mixed heritage with ancestral roots in England, Heiltsuk (known to English speakers as Bella Bella) and Tsimshian (known to English speakers as Skeena) First Nations. She is currently Director of Mental Health and Wellness with First Nations Health Authority. She completed a doctorate degree in the transformative aspects of the Ayaawx (Tsimshian ancestral law).

Feb 28th: Lenten series #3: Aliya Hirji - Remembrance of God (Zikr) in Islam: Modes of Spiritual Reflection. Aliya Hirji is an African-Indian-Canadian Ismaili Muslim woman with a BA in Family Studies with an interest in inter-generational transmission of religious values and traditions. Fulfillment to her since 2001 was, and continues to be, building relationships with communities around her on a personal level and travelling the world visiting places of worship in these areas.

March 7th: Lenten series #4: Laura Kaplan, Jewish Rabbi, speaks on Jewish spirituality: "God in Jewish Thought and Experience". Rabbi Laura Duhan Kaplan is Professor of Jewish Studies and Director of Inter-Religious Studies at the Vancouver School of Theology. Her Ph.D. in philosophy, decade as a congregational Rabbi, and studies in Kabbalah have enriched her own experience of the Divine.

March 13th: (Tuesday) Lenten series #5: The Right Reverend Melissa Skelton speaks on Anglican-Benedictine spirituality. Please note, that this session will occur on a **Tuesday** in order to accommodate the Bishop's schedule.

March 21st: Lenten series #6: Harold speaks on current interpretations of the cross and resurrection.

Carol and I of Team 3, and Charlotte, our social work student, set out from St John's this wet morning where Ken met us with 20 packets, hoards of sandwiches and eggs, a bin of clothes, bags of bananas – my goodness!

First stop was 4th & Highbury, where B, D, T, J, and C were there to greet us. C is back in to town to work, he said, but otherwise has been moved to Victoria where his brother is. All gratefully accepted packets and fruit and sandwiches. All seemed good, notwithstanding the penetrating chill in the air. J took some nice-looking outer wear pants – D accepted some extra socks. All have places to sleep, indoors.



At 4th & Vine today was M, sleeping in front of an empty storefront on the south side of 4th. He said he'd had a rough time lately, saying all his stuff had been stolen (mentioned crackheads). We left him a pair of outer-wear pants, and sweater, a hat, and a packet, fruit, sandwich and egg. He went back to sleep but thanked profusely.

There was no one at the Shoppers at 4th/Vine today. Kitty corner was just P, the Megaphone guy. He greatly accepted and packet/sandwich/egg/fruit.

At 4th & Maple we stopped to see R and C. This was the first time I'd met them, but they indicated they'd been there for a long while. R (30s I'd guess) is quiet friendly – his "brother" C (40s ??) is quite a bit less talkative. R sleeps right there under the storefront overhang at the southwest corner, and C says he sleeps across 4th and a few storefronts done. They indicated they'd 'done the forms' for housing, but they are somewhat particular about where they'd go "not over the bridge" (motioning toward downtown). R said knows about the Kits breakfast. As for shelters, says he is not interested (bad experiences with drugged-out people there). At Granville and 10th we saw S and G. They were well and accepted our food stuffs, but were not very talkative.

Up the street at Granville & 12th, we left a packet for someone's belongings there protected under a tarp.

At Broadway & Burrard in front of the Shoppers we saw T (a.k.a. J) and R. I might have met R once before, a long while ago. He lives at the 4th & Fir apartments. T I had not met before today, though he says he's been there for 3 years, and sleeps in the underground parking at the computer store building on southwest corner of Broadway/Burrard. T is very outgoing and friendly. He says he is on the list (applied) for the new modular housing (57th & Cambie) coming. R took a shirt and a hat and an extra pair of socks. Both thanked us.

At 8th & Burrard we saw A, pushing a cart. I've seen A before on occasion (an abnormality with his nose). He seemed pretty happy, says he has a place to sleep, and indicated that he bins just for extra money.

At Broadway & Vine there was another set of belongings (only), so we left some items.

No one else along the western rest of Broadway today.

We continued up the hill towards 10th Ave. At the United Church on 8th & Tolmie we left items for B.

On 10th Ave in front of the bank at Sasamat we saw R standing with a walker. It has been a very long time since seeing R. He continues to look more frail, more hunched, and his complexion a bit jaundice to me. He says he is indoors to sleep. We reminded him of the Saturday breakfast at Kits available (he seemed to have forgotten of it). He took a packet/sandwich/egg/fruit.

We looked for A but we could not find him, so Carol took a packet/sandwich/egg/fruit combo in hopes to find him later.

We returned to St John's and dropped off the unused clothes and a few fruit.

On my drive home through Dunbar I saw J at the Shoppers on Dunbar. He was delighted to take a packet.

I hope I didn't miss anyone. Hmm, just realizing we did not get to the beach today... All in all a very busy outing. Thank-you so much to Charlotte for joining in – she is terrific.

LENT MADNESS 2018 - WHO WILL WIN THE GOLDEN HALO?

Lent Madness began in 2010 as the brainchild of the Rev. Tim Schenck. In seeking a fun, engaging way for people to learn about the men and women comprising the Church's Calendar of Saints, Tim came up with this unique Lenten devotion. Combining his love of sports with his passion for the lives of the saints, Lent Madness was born on his blog "Clergy Family Confidential" which has subsequently moved locations and become "Clergy Confidential".

The format is straightforward: 32 saints are placed into a tournament-like single elimination bracket. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time and Who will win the Golden Halo? people vote for their favourite saint. 16 saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo. The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. Things get a bit more interesting in the subsequent rounds as we offer quotes and quirks, explore legends, and even move into the area of saintly kitsch.
