EASTER SPEAKER SERIES "EXPERIENCING THE RESURRECTION"



The Easter speaker series will run every Wednesday from April 11th to May 9th at 7 pm.

April 11 Michael: "Resurrection Music from 1199 to today" in the Church April 18: Harry Maier, Professor of New Testament, VST "Raised on the third day": The Resurrection of Jesus in the Early Church and Today. This will be held in the Fireside Room.

Paul said, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins.... If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied (1 Cor. 15.17,19). But what did the earliest followers of Jesus mean when they confessed Jesus was raised from the dead? What do we in the 21st century mean when we profess the resurrection of Jesus? Is it a metaphor,

a symbol, an allegory, a scientific fact, a historical event, all of these things, or none of them? This talk invites us to explore what early Christians believed and ways they might teach us how to believe today. In the end, we will see that our lives indeed do depend on the resurrection, but not in the way many of us may at first think. Harry O. Maier (vst.edu/people/dr-harry-o-maier) is Professor of New Testament and Early Christian Studies at Vancouver School of Theology, where he has taught since 1990. He is also a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and a Fellow at the Max Weber Center for Advanced Cultural and Social Studies at the University of Erfurt.

April 25: Michael: "Bach and Handel - a Resurrection Comparison". This will be held in the Church. May 2: The Rev. Alasdair Smith: "Resurrection in Politics and Public life". This will be held in the Fireside Room.

May 9: The Rev'd Dr. Marilyn Hames: "Mary Magdalene —a history/artistic journey". Mary Magdalene has had quite the journey that took her from being regarded by the Church as the First Apostle, to a common whore, to the reformed sinner par extraordinaire, to everywoman/everyman, and recently being recognized and restored to the title 'Apostle to the Apostles'.

A couple of weeks ago Lama and Sedra, the oldest child, were called back to the Visa Office for fingerprints. These are required for visas for entry to Canada from Lebanon for anyone over 14. T asked us to keep an eye out for S who was apparently hanging out at the Safeway on Broadway!

We then headed over to Jericho Hostel and looked around for M but he was nowhere to be found. We found P, our megaphone fellow, at his usual spot on the corner of Whole Foods. He was also happy to chat for a minute and take some provisions. We did not see anyone else in this area this time round. Heading on down Fourth, we found R and C sitting on the bench.... They were in great spirits and happy to take food and chat.

We then headed over to Granville, were we found G. He took everything including P&J sandwiches. He asked about housing and wondered if he and S were on the list for the housing at Marpole. He seemed keen about getting into housing. We did not see S but left him some items. Paris advised that Dr. Janet was working with G and S with respect to the housing.

We found S and a new woman named K outside the London Drugs on Broadway. She appeared to be settled there with a sleeping bag, etc. She was quiet, but extremely alert and clean cut looking. She seemed happy to take food but as S arrived up just as we got there, we got talking to him and did not get much information from her. S was very chatty and was concerned that he had missed H and perhaps his opportunity to get housing. He asked us to get in touch with her which we did and Heather has since been in contact with him. Hopefully if K is still at the LD location, our next week's team might get more information from her... or perhaps others have already seen her?

We found S (M) outside the Safeway. He was happy to see us. He chatted on for quite some time. Said he was not drinking so much and feeling better. He did hope to get housing but as we mentioned in an earlier report, he is concerned about mixing fellows who are addicted to drugs with fellows who drink... he did not think it would work well. We told him we were optimistic about the housing program and that it would be a success. On route back up to drop off Paris at her digs at UBC we stopped by the United Church. B was there but although we tried to persuade him to accept some food, he declined... he said he was happy and did not need anything.

We had a lovely day, the weather was nice and the fellows and lady were in good form. Thanks from Team 2
