Paul said, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins.... If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied (1 Cor. 15.17,19). But what did the earliest followers of Jesus mean when they confessed Jesus was raised from the dead? What do we in the 21st century mean when we profess the resurrection of Jesus? Is it a metaphor, a symbol, an allegory, a scientific fact, a historical event, all of these things. or none of them? This talk invites us to explore what early Christians believed and ways they might teach us how to believe today. In the end, we will see that our lives indeed do depend on the resurrection, but not in the way many of us may at first think.

Harry O. Maier (vst.edu/people/dr-harry-o-maier) is Professor of New Testament and Early Christian Studies at Vancouver School of Theology, where he has taught since 1990. He is also a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and a Fellow at the Max Weber Center for Advanced Cultural and Social Studies at the University of Erfurt.

#### **REFUGEE NEWS**

The application for our sponsorship of Lama and her four children is still in process at the Canadian Visa Office in Beirut. In early February the Visa Office requested that Lama provide a death certificate for her late husband. This seems to be impossible. Recently, with a lot of input from Lama and her family, and much very helpful advice from the Diocesan Refugee Unit, an explanation with some documentation was submitted to the Visa Office. We are hoping for a favorable response from them soon.

We estimate that we will need \$40,000 for the basic support of Lama and her children for one year. So far we have \$32, 660.

The applications for the sponsorship of Lama's parents and brother are also in process at the Canadian Visa Office in Beirut. These were submitted about 7 months later than Lama's application. Not surprisingly, they have not been contacted for interviews yet. We have received \$10,000 from the Lear family for support of the parents. \$5000 for the parents and brother were pledged by St. Faith's parish. This is a good start for this part of the sponsorship, so donations coming in, unless otherwise specified, will be allocated to the \$40,000 for Lama and children.

## NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY REPORT FOR SATURDAY, MARCH 17<sup>TH</sup>

Team 5 (Dale, Carol, Paris, & Tim) set out from St. Philip's after Don set us up. First stop, Dunbar and 28th. J was welcoming, good spirits but has back problems. He says the medications that the doctors are giving him make him appear dopey. Appears to be living in Dunbar residence, but he was evasive.

Next, 4th & Highbury: B (now living out at Commercial but it's vermin-ridden; he has applied to Steve's at Jericho), D, next to him is C? who asked for underwear, A (post stroke, looks understandably more frail and grey, but sharp and cheerful), T (energetic as ever), M (needs rain jacket), C (still living in Victoria but here for work). Irish green was theme of the day. 4th and Vine. Megaphone P (has place at 31st & Vic), T in front of Whole Foods, talkative (our candidate for church man—he's got the touch) and N took the bag but did not engage much. Spoke of trouble since he doesn't have citizenship.

Granville up from Broadway. G & S, staked out across the street from each other. G cheerful, S less so (hands seem a bit swollen). Seems, from Paris's experience with BC Housing that there have been issues in setting up the interviews.


Finally, Broadway & Vine. S in front of London Drugs. He was slumped over but woke and engaged, asking about followup on the housing interview. He riffled through the bag, per usual for the Ensure, and then calmly placed the entire bag by his side. We were gobsmacked into silence. We wrapped up back at St. Philip's.

#### Report from MCU team at St. Mary's

(Charlotte, Paris, Gary, Dr. Janet, Erica (Resident working with Dr. Janet) and Karen) Tuesday, March 13<sup>th</sup> was relatively busy for our usually quiet site. One fellow came by to check in with the social services team to see if his US birth certificate had arrived – not so far. Another provided the paperwork required for us to apply to SAFER on his behalf for a rent subsidy. A third fellow worked with Paris who did a terrific job of completing Part 3 of the PWD application. (The client's doctor has submitted the medical report for the application.) Paris will go over the Part 3 form with Kat Potter later this week. The fourth fellow, who will be housed at Dunbar Apartments within a week, worked with us to complete some paperwork and also received a TB test from the medical team. He will be required to have this read at a clinic in a few days. He has been homeless for some time and is very excited about his new apartment, which apparently has a great view! Charlotte and Paris listened very patiently to a woman's story regarding her recent hospitalization. She also spoke with Dr. Janet.

Finally, the medical team measured a client's blood pressure and also checked a man who had recently experienced an allergic reaction.
