# PRESENTATION OF FUNDRAISING FEASIBILITY STUDY FINDINGS

Mr. Rob Waller of Waller & Associates Ltd., a fundraising consultant well known within the Diocese and the wider community, was retained by our parish to conduct a Campaign Feasibility Study for a proposed capital campaign to raise new funds in order to repair, renew and reconfigure several church facilities and undertake additional new initiatives involving staffing and programs. 95 parishioners participated in the study either through a personal interview with Rob or through a survey format.

Mr. Waller has now provided the full report to the Trustees and Study Task Group. He is able to provide an early indication of the level of support that can be expected, with observations on the significance of these findings, along with key recommendations that he believes St. Philip's should follow in order to move forward with a successful capital campaign.

Today, following the 10 AM service, Mr. Waller will be at St. Philip's to present his report to the parish in order to allow an opportunity for questions. The report is available on the website, so you may read the report in advance of the presentation.

## **NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY**

Once a month a team of volunteers leaves from St. Philips to bring a packet of food, as well as sandwiches, fruit & boiled eggs and donated items of clothing to our street friends on the West side of Vancouver, some housed and some living on the street. Thanks to the generosity of the congregation, we've only had to spend a small part of our budget on food. The indoor team puts together the food and clothing items and an outdoor team picks them up from St. Philips on a Saturday morning. The outdoor team drives around the West side of Vancouver looking for people who are living on the street and stopping at the spots they know they will find some for their regulars. Our numbers have been down over the winter months as many of our street friends have moved into supported housing.

In order to prepare for the next few months, we are having a Neighbourhood Ministry Sunday - on February 17<sup>th</sup> we'd like parishioners to bring food items to church and we'll make the food packets after church. We'll need: canned meat; fruit juice boxes; nutrition drinks (like Ensure or Boost); protein bars (the kind without nuts, seeds or granola - easy to chew); and fruit cups, applesauce, or pudding cups. We could also use men's underwear - size L or X;, bandaids or small first aid kits; small can openers; compostable spoons and/or forks; sleeping mats; blankets and sleeping bags. Join us after church!

The following is a summary of the activities of the Westside Anglicans Neighbourhood Ministry for the beginning of January 2019, including highlights from our Saturday Street Outreach teams and our Mobile Care Unit (MCU). Over the course of the last two weeks, the MCU social service teams visiting St. Augustine's, Kits Showers and M. Mitchell Place served a total of 12 clients, while the medical side saw 8 clients. The Street Teams made 30 connections in the Neighbourhood. The main area of service from the MCU sites continues to be assistance with

Housing forms and replacement of IDs.

The development of Modular Housing Complexes have resulted in many of our friends being housed for the first time in years. It is a good thing to hear from our Street teams that now only a fraction of the people they encounter are officially homeless. Clothing and food continue to be gratefully received. Thank you to the parishioners from St. Anselm's, St. Philip's and St. Helen's and St. John's for their generosity of items donated.
