REFUGEE NEWS - How you can help with the next phase



Lama's parents, Nasriddin and Fatmeh, and her brother Ward have been in Vancouver for a month. By now much of the early "bureaucratic phase" has been completed. Ward started English classes June 4. A priority in the near future is helping all the adults find work, as well as helping them with English. Meanwhile, Lama and her four children are all wrapping up their first year of school in Canada. Lama has found work doing kitchen cleanup and food prep for a catering company. She has been working for just over a week, but seems happy with the job.

We need:

- 1. Help finding jobs: You may have contacts with a company that might employ one of the family.
 - Ward, age 25, has some experience as a painter and construction worker. He indicates a preference for painting. He came with a few words of English, seems to learn quickly, is in good health, and is a very pleasant young man.
 - Nasriddin, age 63, also knows a few words of English. He was a driver almost all his adult life, but of course does not have a licence here. He is not physically robust. At home he does some of the cooking. Perhaps restaurant work would be suitable.
 - Fatmeh, age 55, enjoys cooking. She has back problems and probably could only work part time.
- 2. Tutoring: The adults especially would welcome extra help with English. The schedule is flexible. Teaching qualifications are not a requirement.

3. Money: Lama and her children came on September 13, 2018 so we are responsible for their support until September 13, 2019, but would expect to give some financial support at a reduced rate beyond that time. Nasridin, Fatmeh and Ward arrived on May 16, 2019, so we are responsible for their support until May 16, 2020.

We have a goal of raising \$25,000 to complete this ministry. NEIGHBOURHOOD MINISTRY

Neighbourhood Ministry Street Report from Saturday, July 6, 2019 Dale and I set out from St. Philip's amply provided with packets, peanut butter and jam sandwiches, fresh fruit, hard boiled eggs, chocolate, water, and a bag of clothing.

First, we checked B's camp at the United Church on west 8th, but he was not there – we left him a packet. Our next stop was 4th and Highbury, where we found T, B, W and R (who we hadn't met before).

Everyone was happy to receive food and packets, and W and R took a few sweaters/tee shirts. W is having some health problems, with a tooth that led to sinusitis; she hasn't been able to work her usual amount because of this. She asked for a contact number in case her condition worsens, and we advised her to go to the Kits Showers program if this happens.

We had forgotten that this weekend was Khatsahlano days, with fourth being closed to traffic from MacDonald to Burrard. So, we headed up to Broadway, where we found a fellow at Broadway and Cypress, sheltering from the rain. He was a very thin fellow with a gray beard, and of South Asian descent. He looked quite ill but did not want any food or clothing.

At South Granville we found a fellow between the Jordan's and the MacDonald's; he was very grateful for the fresh food and packets. There was a heavily loaded shopping basket near him, and he said his friend would be back there shortly, so we left some food and a packet there as well.

Next we went to a park between west fourth and fifth and Granville and Fir Streets, where we found a blue tent. No one was there, so we left some food and a packet. Since fourth was blocked, we headed back west going through some of the alleys but didn't see anyone.

We did find a fellow who said his name was W on Alma between Broadway and 10th. He was very talkative and happy to receive food, a packet and also a couple of items of clothing.

We took the remainder of our fresh food to the 17th and Dunbar apartments.
