They are also accepting jeans and winter shoes.

REFUGEE NEWS - How you can help with the next phase

Lama and her four children have been in Canada for a year, so the formal sponsorship period has ended but we continue to care for them. They are approaching financial independence in that Lama has found work with a catering company, almost full time. After work, she attends evening ELL classes three days a week. Having received the approval of Church Committee, we continue financial support for Lama and her children for the next several months at a reduced rate.



Lama's parents and her brother Ward (25) arrived in May, attend language classes, and their sponsorships pay a share of the rent and food for the whole family of eight who live together.

Immediate priorities:

1. Work: Ward has some experience as a house painter and construction helper, knows some

English and learns quickly. It would be very helpful if any of you has some house painting to be done and would be willing to take the time to supervise Ward, or if you have contacts with a company that needs a painter or construction helper.

2. Money: Nasridin, Fatmeh and Ward arrived on May 16, 2019, so we are responsible for their support until May 16, 2020. To that end, we need ongoing financial gifts to see us through until May 2020. Thank you to all who have contributed so generously.
